



Recipe Ideas

Fresh Mango and Strawberry Popsicles

Ingredients:

-12-15 large fresh strawberries, hulled and halved

-2 whole ripe mango, peeled, pitted and cut into chunks

Instructions:

- 1) Puree mango chunks until smooth and set aside.
- 2) Puree the strawberries until smooth and set aside.

3) In your mold, fill 1/3 way with your mango puree, then follow with another 1/3 of Strawberry puree and then top it off with the mango.

4) Cover mold, add sticks and freeze for at least 5 hours or overnight.

Standards

FAMILY DAYHOME STANDARDS MANUAL FOR ALBERTA

This manual contains the standards for Dayhomes and Dayhome agencies to provide child care. Every month we will review a Standard.

Standard 8: Child Supervision

Children receive developmentally appropriate supervision by the program educator at all times.

Up to 19 months

- Within the educator's sight at all times,
- unless the children are napping, in which case, an infant monitor must be used

20 months to 4 years

- Not allowed to use outdoor play space without supervision
- Must be within hearing distance of the educator at all times
- Educator physically checks every 3-5 minutes
- When children are napping, an infant monitor may be used

5 years to 8 years

- May use outdoor play space without supervision if they are within sight of the educator (e.g., through a window)
- Educator physically checks every 5-10 minutes

9 years to 12 years

- May be allowed more freedom within the residence and in the program's private outdoor play space
- Educator must know where children are at all times
- Educator physically checks frequently, considering what is age appropriate and developmentally appropriate for the children being cared for

Learning Story

Being a Friend

With lots of loose-parts and open-ended materials offered, I was lucky to observe a gorgeous interaction between Jiro and Jimmel.

Jimmel and Jiro engage socially with one another, playing blocks and cars together. "Pick," Jiro asserts, handing the dime carton blocks or coin rollers to Jimmel. He's the one taking the lead.

Jimmel accepts, collects the blocks, and places them in the truck, imagining these are logs. As their play continues, Jiro and Jimmel engage in a dialogue about the logs. Jiro suggests, "Go, put blocks," and Jimmel responds, "Fast, go," encouraging each other as they load all the logs into the truck.

What learning is happening here?

Isn't this how life is at its best: friends cheering each other throughout their play tasks, communicating and building responsive and reciprocal relationships? Respecting each other.

Children have a strong sense of identity, and Jimmel and Jiro interact with each other with care and respect.

Children are effective communicators. They make choices which help them establish and nurture friendships and develop understanding.
