Activity Idea

Building Forts

Besides being just plain, old, simple fun, fort-building can provide a long list of benefits for your children.

-Keep them active (Physicality is involved with building, crawling in and out of it and laying down inside) -Encourage problem-solving skills (What can I use to hold it up? How can I connect the sheets together or

make it taller? How can I enter it? How can I fix it when it falls?)

-Give them something to spend time on other than screens

(Although that can be fun to do in a fort, too!)

-Increase their spatial awareness

- -Help them with focus and patience
- -Deliver an escape to another world
- -Build confidence
- -Stimulate brain development
- -Teach the planning process
- -Promote a vivid imagination and creative play
- -Improve their thinking and reasoning skills
- -Demand that they find inventive uses of everyday items
- -Free them to creatively decorate the space to their taste
- -Allow them to develop math and science skills naturally
- -Afford them the opportunity to create an independent DIY project
- -Provide them with an incentive to read
- (since that's always more fun to do in a fort!)
- -Create a positive environment for teamwork
- (if built with others, although it's a great activity to do alone, as well!)
- -Foster autonomy and allow them to be in charge regulate



Learning Story

Rocks and Mulch Exploration

Three adventurous boys, Valentino, Zavian, and Russell, gathered around a sensory table filled with rocks and mulch. Eager to explore, they grabbed miniature construction vehicles, their eyes sparkling with excitement. Zavian drove a bright yellow bulldozer, pushing rocks around, while Valentino expertly maneuvered a blue dump truck, filling it with mulch. Russell joined in, got the cement truck, and filled it with mulch; Zavian, not to be outdone, created a "construction site" by piling rocks high. Then they switched their construction vehicles as they laughed and collaborated, and their imaginations ran wild, turning the sensory table into a bustling construction zone where teamwork and creativity flourished amidst the textures of their play.

Children create imaginary scenarios in which they explore new possibilities and take possession of their worlds by creating social spaces and shared narratives, alternative systems of power, and coping with emotional pressure.

Children learn to negotiate the complexities of joint understandings by negotiating rules of time, space, and roles. They make collective plans and decisions about the directions of play and develop a sense of fairness. (See photos on the next page)
